1. Background of Democracy

Democracy means power of the people in Greek. Democracy originated in Athens during the 5th century BC. Democracy in Athens was very different from more modern forms. There were two main factors that were considered essential to the success of ancient democracy: the size of the community must not be too large, because this would not allow all members of to participate in debates and meetings, and citizens should have enough free time to actively engage in politics. In Athens, this meant that slaves were used to perform the majority of work. True democracy is a two-way street, built on a constant dialogue between civil society and the political class. This dialogue must have real influence on political decisions. This is why political participation, civic space and social dialogue make up the very foundations of good governance.

In September 1997 the Inter-Parliamentary Union (IPU), (an international form of which Pakistan is also a member) adopted a Universal Declaration on Democracy. That Declaration affirms the principles of democracy, the elements and exercise of democratic government, and the international scope of democracy. In 2013, IPU promoted the International Day of Democracy through its Member Parliaments in 162 countries. In 2007 the United Nations General Assembly resolved to observe 15 September as the International Day of Democracy—with the purpose of promoting and upholding the principles of democracy—and invited all member states and organizations to commemorate the day in an appropriate manner that contributes to raising public awareness.

The International Day of Democracy offers an opportunity to look for ways to strengthen democracy and seek approaches for the systemic citizen engagement. This includes reaching out to masses to understand the role parliament plays and can potentially play in tackling economic and political inequalities and making democracies more inclusive by bringing the young and marginalized into the political system.

Women Parliamentary Caucus (WPC) is a cross party forum which provides women legislators a platform for the development, empowerment and emancipation of women beyond party politics. WPC in collaboration with Westminster Foundation for Democracy (WFD)² planned to engage with Pakistani youth to showcase their talents and simultaneously develop their understanding of the parliamentary system in Pakistan.

2. Introduction to 'Jamhuriat Hum Se'

WPC brought together youth from seventy-two universities from all across Pakistan to interact with Parliamentarians through a month long online competition and prize distributing event known as 'Jamhoriat Hum Se'. The theme of the competition was based around the importance of democracy and women participation; it consisted of an online quiz, blog writing, poster designing and video messages.

Since 2012, WFD supported the federal and provincial legislatures in Pakistan. Working with local partners to make WFD's initiatives sustainable has been at the centre of its approach. From the beginning, it has worked closely with the Pakistan Institute for Parliamentary Services (PIPS), which is the institution mandated by parliament to support in matters of research, legislation and capacity building across all legislatures of the federation.

This competition was officially launched by National Assembly Speaker Mr. Asad Qaiser on 19th September 2019 to commemorate 'International Democracy Day' at Pakistan Institute for Parliamentary Services (PIPS). This event was attended by National Assembly and Senate Parliamentarians, civil society organisations (Tabeer, UNDP, UN-Women, UNICEF, Oxfoam), university students and their respective faculties. The follow-up closing ceremony was held on 27th November, 2019 at PIPS. Chief Guest, Minister for Planning, Development and Reforms Mr. Asad Umer gave the keynote speech and distributed awards to winning participants.

3. Objective

The overall object of 'Jumhuriat Hum Se' was to highlight the intent of Parliament in engaging more proactively with Pakistani citizens especially youth. This intent was divided into three specific objectives:

- 1. To increase the Pakistani citizen's understanding of the parliament and the citizen's specific role in inclusive democracy.
- 2. To engage and increase interaction of citizens (especially young future leaders and marginalized groups) with parliament especially through WPC.
- 3. To initiate a formal liaison between WPC, youth and women at digital media outlets for continued engagement beyond the event.

4. Methodology

The event followed a detailed phased approach to engage the youth.

- 1. **Design Phase Activities:** A panel of judges were finalised; two judges were famous bloggers to assess the blogging writing of the competition, Robina Khursheed Alam judged the poster and video competition. Systems were put in place to ensure transparency in both submissions into the competition and approach to dealing with inquiries.
- 2. **Promotional Phase:** WPC facilitated the parliament through its various sections reach out to segments of people working in the relevant areas with an effort to invite participation in the event.
 - In this regard each section encouraged their respective audiences such as women caucus focus on engaging women and young parliamentarians mobilizing youth from universities through a planned engagement while conducting information and invitation sessions as well as social media campaigns facilitated by Social Media team.
- 3. The Launch: A series of competitions "Jamhoriat Hum Se" was also inaugurated by Honourable Speaker, National Assembly, Mr. Qaiser. This series of competitions will invite submissions in different categories such as, Blog writing, Online Quiz etc.
- 4. The Closing event: The event will invite the top three submissions in each category, asking them to present their work to the leading relevant parliamentary panels. Present them with awards for working with the Parliament. The event would be attended by academia, young leaders, media groups, diplomatic corps and students who have participated in the online quiz as well as parliamentarians.

4.1. Details of Competition

The closing ceremony was mainly a price distributing ceremony for university students that won in the 'Jamhoriat Hum Sai' themed competitions. The competition was broken down into the following parts:

- 1. Poster Competition on 'Women in Democracy'.
- 2. Video Competition (30 second videos) on 'Youth Participation in Democracy its importance and dynamics'.
- 3. Blog writing competition on 'Democracy Vs Majoritarianism'.
- 4. Online Quiz on 'Know your Parliament'.

There were a variety of prices that were distributed amongst the participants including:

- 1. Certificates of participation for all participants.
- 2. Cash prizes (Rs. 20,000, Rs. 15,000, and Rs. 10,000) for top three submissions in each category.
- 3. Letter of appreciation from WPC Secretary.
- 4. Exclusive meeting and dinner with Speaker National Assembly Asad Qaisar, Secretary WPC Munaza Hassan and senior political leadership from other parties.

The desired outcomes of the events were:

- 1. Citizens have better understanding about the Parliament as a whole.
- 2. Better awareness on avenues for inclusion and participation for common citizens.
- 3. Strengthening image of the house as an inclusive representative of the citizens.
- 4. Increased awareness and understanding among MPs on areas of inclusion and their importance.

5. Highlights of Opening Ceremony (September 2019)

Welcome Address by WPC Secretary Ms. Munaza Hassan:

Honourable Secretary WPC, Ms. Munaza Hassan after welcoming the panellists and guests highlighted that purpose of the event was to bring the youngsters close to the parliament and to involve them within the political process. Ms. Munaza also highlighted the importance of youth in promotion of democracy and encouraged students to take ownership of their state and work for its betterment. She also concentrated on the need for Pakistani youth to take inspiration from the struggles and guidance Quaid-e-Azam Mohammad Ali Jinnah.

Keynote Speech by National Assembly (NA) Speaker Mr. Asad Qaiser:

Mr. Asad Qaiser spoke at length about the sheer importance of active participation of citizens in democracy and also about the need to follow democratic ideals at an intra-party level. He focused on the need for





intra-party election, giving workers respect and opportunities to lead and hold decision-making positions. He motivated the youth to strive and struggle for a better tomorrow. He also reminded the young audience of their importance within the system.

The Speech of Mr. Asad Qaisar was followed by formal inauguration of *'Jamhoriat Hum Se'* competition. The inauguration was followed by speeches of the distinguished panellists. After the panellist speeches the floor was opened to take questions from the audience.


In their speeches, the panellists discussed the of importance youth participation in the democratic process especially in a country like Pakistan which is racially and ethnically very diverse. The panel pressed on the need for youth to work hard for strengthening of democracy in Pakistan. The perils of dictatorships and autocratic governments were focused upon with freedom



of expression and human rights violation as the main elements of it.

Interestingly, most of the male audience members were directing their questions to the only male parliamentarian, Mr. Asad Umar, on the panel. Male audience questions were more general and open ended. While questions from female audience members were issue based and addressed to the whole panel. 6. Salient features from the speeches of Key Speakers

Honourable Asad Umar – Federal Minister for Planning, Development and Reforms (Chief Guest)

- Two years back UNDP was making a report related to youth in Pakistan - the most common and important point that was raised by the youth, as per the report, was that their voice are not being heard.
- Youth comprises 2/3 of the population of Pakistan; they are the biggest and most genuine stakeholders in the affairs of the country. It is very important that they are heard and included in decision-making.



- The youth of Pakistan is very dynamic and full of energy. They are optimistic and positive unlike the old politicians who rule the prime talk shows. They are negative and full of pessimism. We need to give youth more and more space so that they can take the country forward.
- This partnership of Women Parliamentary Caucus is very logical, in my opinion, considering the fact that it is always the youth and women of a country, you will find in the forefront of the movements demanding change.
- Youth are the torch bearers of change. They are fearless, and optimistic; they are ready to take risks and fight. These factors play the key role in change-making. Women being mothers are naturally more concerned about the future of their children, which leads to them having the same perspective on different matters. Hence, we see them both always partnering up for change.






Main questions that were raised by the audience during the interactive session

Round I:

- i. How can Parliamentarians ensure the public that if they openly speak up, their livelihoods would not be threatened?
- ii. What is the work that has been done by National Assembly towards filing of public petition to the Standing Committees in National Assembly?
- iii. Should Pakistan have a Parliamentary form of Government or Presidential form of Government? Which one is better?
- iv. Globally there is a debate going on that debt-based economy should be replaced by resource based economy because debt base economy keeps wealth in certain hands and is not climate friendly? What system is better for Pakistan?

Round II:

- v. Why has KP Government imposed the rule for students to wear burqas to school and other provinces have not when harassment is the issue that women face in all provinces alike?
- vi. The elected Representatives of people from North and South Waziristan were jailed for 3-4 months on the basis of suspicion. For all this time, people of North and South Waziristan had no representation in the Parliament? What kind of democracy is this?


